





Life Recovery Scores in Years 2001, 2003, & 2005




Life Recovery Calendar

 - Work/School activities returned to normalcy (N=651)
 Solving housing issues completed (N=759)
 EQ no longer affects our household economy (N=694)
 My life is back to normal (N=800)
 No longer feel that I am a disaster victim (N=709)
 EQ no longer affects the local economy (N=582)




①Work/School activities returned to normalcy among a half of the survivors within 1,000 hours




②Housing and ③Household Economy Issues were managed among a half of the survivors within about 10,000 hours




It took about two years until a half of survivors felt their lives back to normal and no longer being a disaster victim





Only a little less than 80 % of survivors felt their lives back to normal and no longer being a disaster victim ten years after the EQ








Number of Opinion Cards for Each Life Recovery Category













Proportion of Life Recovery Categories in 1999, 2003 and 2004 Workshops









Level of Civic-mindedness by Degree of Recovery


